

# **AUTHORS' GUIDELINES**

## **Manuscript submission**

Papers must describe original research not published nor currently under review by other journals. Parallel submissions will not be accepted. All submitted papers, if relevant to the themes and objectives of the journal, will go through an external peer-review process. The decision about any submitted paper will be taken within four to five months of receipt.

Publication in *Statistica Applicata-Italian Journal of Applied Statistics* is free of charge.

*Authors are kindly asked to comply with all the Journal's Instructions.*

**British and American English:** the articles must be written in British English; nevertheless, also American English may be accepted.

Please, note that a mixed of these two English language styles cannot be accepted.

### **1) Initial submission**

All papers must be submitted via the online system (<https://www.sa-ijas.org/ojs/index.php/sa-ijas/about/submissions>), either in DOC ([download](#)) or LaTeX format ([download](#)). Only papers in English will be considered.

The submitted article will be peer reviewed in a double-blind process (authors and reviewers are anonymous to each other).

Please submit an **unblinded version** of your paper (one PDF file). Within the unblinded manuscript, at the beginning, include a **Title Page (first page)**.

In what follows, the outlined instructions:

**1-The Title page** should include:

- The Title of the manuscript (also repeated in the text of the manuscript);
- The name(s) and surname(s) of the author(s);
- The affiliation(s) of the author(s), i.e. institution, (department), city, (state), country;
- A clear indication and an active e-mail address (possibly institutional) of the corresponding author;
- If available, the 16-digit ORCID of the author(s);
- Acknowledgements and funding details (if relevant);

**2-The text of the manuscript** should include:

- the **Title** of the manuscript (repeated);
- the **Abstract** (maximum 200 words). An abstract is a concise summary of the whole paper, not just the conclusions, and is understandable without reference to the rest of the paper. It should contain no citation to other published work.



Reference list entries should be alphabetized by the last names of the first author of each work.
